Their second film with writer Ruth Prawer Jhabvala, its portrait of a group of travelling players trying to keep Shakespeare alive in the sticks is often superbly apt, based as it is on the experiences of the Kendal family who play in the film. Shot by Subrata Mitra, Satyajit Ray's cameraman, and equipped with a score by Ray himself, the cast includes Shashi Kapoor and Felicity Kendal as star-crossed lovers, and Madhur Jaffrey doing a triumphant turn as an outrageous Indian movie queen. Heat and Dust

Amid the contrasting landscapes of the Deccan, Kashmir and London, this film – high-spirited and romantic – deals with the colonial and 'Indian' India. The latter had an effect on a western sensibility in the 1920s and 1980s, as well as the tug of feeling set up when a choice has to be made between the beloved familiar and the mysteriously attractive unknown. From pre-Hays Code dramas to 1950s westerns, Barbara Stanwyck consistently impressed with her poise, charisma and versatility, writes season co-programmer **Aga Baranowska**

Comedies, melodramas, thrillers... Stanwyck adapted to any genre, sparkling with natural wit and radiating sheer presence and raw emotion. But it was the western that became increasingly important as her career progressed. She made 12 in all, and in the three screening this month she plays resourceful, confident women holding their own in a male-dominated world. In the 1950s (her final decade in cinema before she moved to TV), she defied expectations of a female star working in Hollywood by selecting roles as a freelance actor not tied to one studio, and by portraying mature women who were passionate, motivated and possessed of minds very much their own. This second part of our tribute highlights the breadth and depth of Stanwyck's characters, whether in classics or in less familiar, rarely screened titles.



The Miracle Woman

USA 1931, Dir Frank Capra, With Barbara Stanwyck, David Manners, Sam Hardy, 90min, Digital, PG Her faith shaken by her father's death, a minister's daughter (Stanwyck) teams up with a conman to stage evangelical shows in which she performs 'miracles.' But then the unexpected happens... Stanwyck manages to make her character loosely based on Aimee Semple McPherson - both credible and sympathetic, notwithstanding the fake claims and tacky razzmatazz of her circus; Capra's sensitive direction steers clear of facile moralising.



Annie Oakley

USA 1935. Dir George Stevens. With Barbara Stanwyck, Preston Foster, Melvyn Douglas. 83min. **35mm** U

The first western for Stanwyck (and, indeed, Stevens) was based on the life of 'Little Miss Sureshot,' one of the most famous sharpshooters in American history. It focuses on Oakley's rise to fame with Buffalo Bill's Wild West Show and her feelings for fellow star Toby Walker. Stanwyck oozes confidence in her portrayal of the determined and spirited protagonist.

The Mad Miss Manton

USA 1938. Dir Leigh Jason. With Barbara Stanwyck, Henry Fonda, Sam Levene, Hattie McDaniel. 80min. **35mm** U

A scatty but canny heiress (Stanwyck), whose claims to have discovered a murder are dismissed by the police, enlists a working-class journalist (Fonda) to help prove her case. This delightful screwball-mysteryromance paved the way for *The Lady Eve*, and while Nic Musuraca's characteristically noir-ish camerawork boosts the suspense, it's the performances and Philip G Epstein's witty repartee that matter most.



Union Pacific

USA 1939. Dir Cecil B DeMille. With Barbara Stanwyck, Joel McCrea, Robert Preston. 135min. 35mm U

Characteristically, De Mille brought an epic sense of scale to the western with this story of the construction of the First Transcontinental Railroad. Mixed in with all the historical elements is a love triangle between a troubleshooter (McCrea), a gambler (Preston), and a train engineer's daughter (Stanwyck). The director was mesmerised by Stanwyck's performance, and she became one of his favourite stars.



Remember the Night

USA 1940. Dir Mitchell Leisen. With Barbara Stanwyck, Fred MacMurray, Beulah Bondi. 94min. Digital. PG

A New York attorney (MacMurray) takes pity on a shoplifter he's prosecuting (Stanwyck); he gets her out on bail and invites her to his family home for Christmas – which somewhat complicates their relationship. There's genuine chemistry between Stanwyck and MacMurray in their first film together, an amusing and affecting blend of courtroom drama, road movie and romance written by Preston Sturges. When a columnist (Stanwyck) invents a story about a tramp planning to commit suicide in protest against the state of the world, the resulting interest forces her paper to get someone to fit the role. The fellow they find (Cooper) instantly becomes a celebrity – and a political pawn. Capra's anti-fascist parable, though naïve and conflicted, remains relevant today; likewise, the starry cast still sparkles.

When nightclub dancer and gangster's girlfriend Sugarpuss O'Shea (Stanwyck) needs to lie low, a house shared by eight professors researching American slang provides the ideal hideout. Producer Samuel Goldwyn assembled

an A-list of collaborators on both sides of the camera for this delightful screwball comedy inspired by the story of Snow White; razor-sharp dialogue and perfect Hawksian comic timing are the result.

Will she be able to fathom who the victim is, and warn her? Stanwyck heads a superb cast that also includes Ed Begley, William Conrad and Leif Erikson.



There's Always Tomorrow

USA 1955. Dir Douglas Sirk. With Barbara Stanwyck, Fred MacMurray, Joan Bennett, Jane Darwell. 84min. 35mm PG

Stanwyck and MacMurray reunited for another tale of adulterous temptation: he's a toy manufacturer feeling neglected by his wife and kids, and she is the ex-employee whose return to Pasadena reignites illicit passions. This being Sirk, rather than film noir, any deadliness is metaphorical; the claustrophobic conformism and complacency of the postwar American Dream are vividly conveyed by direction and performances alike.



Forty Guns

USA 1957. Dir Samuel Fuller. With Barbara Stanwyck, Barry Sullivan, Dean Jagger, Gene Barry. 80min. Digital 4K. PG

In a late-career highlight for Stanwyck, she portrays a wealthy landowner exerting influence over an Arizonian township by commanding a staff of 40 men. But the arrival of a new US Marshal makes life difficult. Beautifully shot in 'Scope, packed with psychosexual subtext and directed with characteristic bravura, Fuller's second western influenced a generation of filmmakers, including Godard and Leone.



Fired with conviction, Straub-Huillet produced an inimitable body of films, retaining a single-minded faith in their art, writes critic **Nick Pinkerton**

Paris, 1954. Jean-Marie Straub, an intimate of many critics and future New Wave directors, met Danièle Huillet. an aspiring ethnographic filmmaker, and a lifelong partnership began. The films that they made together (until Huillet's death in 2006) collectively form a celebration and interrogation of Europe's cultural and political heritage, linking classical and radical traditions. Almost every one of their films would build from direct quotations of an original text, making them adapters by trade - and, paradoxically, among the most original filmmakers of the latter half of the 20th century. Obsessive perfectionists, they created and reworked their austere visual approach and declamatory performance style, exploring the text and the distinctive cadence of their (often non-professional) performers, recorded live. The result is a rigorous, disciplined cinema, defined by a simple beauty and fierce political passion.



He successfully pulled off a powerful, moving picture that helped raise to prominence some striking and relatively unknown acting talent, including Whoopi Goldberg and Oprah Winfrey.

This film is a timely reminder of the tensions between nationalities in the late 1940s when the unifying force of the battle against Hitler was receding, and old rivalries began to resurface. Based on the play Cockpit by Irish writer Bridget Boland, The Lost People focuses on a group of displaced persons from all over Europe who gather in an abandoned theatre in

Germany, from where the British army attempts to return them home. With a screenplay by Boland and Muriel Box and an all-star British cast, this film is a fascinating window onto the European post-war landscape, and suggests that, even 70 years after its release, the political situation in Europe has changed little.



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BEAUTIFUL THINGS

The Mediatheque's epic collection exploring LGBTQ+ lives on screen has continued to grow since its launch in 2007, with well over 200 titles now available. If you're planning a visit to BFI Flare: London LGBTQ+ Film Festival, why not pop in and catch some of the latest additions? There's newly digitised footage of the 1989 London Pride march, while celebs and superfans analyse Corrie's queer appeal in *The Street* (1996). Short films include the story of a young RAF officer court-martialled for being a lesbian in *Disgraceful Conduct* (1995), and you can dive into 2015's multi-channel drama/documentary triptych *Cucumber*, *Banana* and Tofu.





Alexander Korda: Britain's Movie Mogul

Charming and charismatic, Hungarian producer-director Alexander Korda dominated the British film industry in the 1930s, following his huge international success with The Private Life of Henry VIII (1933). His films were ambitious in story, style and scope, adopting lavish Hollywood production values and employing glamorous stars. This exhibition takes us on a journey through Korda's remarkable career via posters, publicity and production papers drawn from the BFI National Archive's Special Collections.

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Get to know Barbara

This month, reacquaint yourself with some of Barbara Stanwyck's greatest roles in classics such as *Double Indemnity or The Lady Eve*, or try something a little less well known – such as the William Castle-directed, Robert Bloch-penned *The Night Walker*, which features a psychotic millionaire, a secluded laboratory and a whole load of cuckoo clocks.

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
